5. Summary

The Department for Transport, Safer Roads Fund grant awarded to the Road Safety and Traffic Management team for road safety improvements on the A609 (Ilkeston Road and Wollaton Road) and the A6130 (Gregory Boulevard, Radford Boulevard and Lenton Boulevard).

The funding allows for proposals to be progressed, which aim to reduce the number and severity of road traffic collisions and resultant casualties by providing a safer environment for road vehicles and users.

The proposals proactively drive forward road safety improvements which will benefit all road users and pedestrians. The project includes improving signage, road markings, cross hatchings, signalised turnings, installing central refuge points and two School Safety Schemes. The proposals will reduce the risk of collisions, which in turn will reduce congestion and idling vehicles, journey times and carbon emissions, the majority of which are identified as coming from journeys on A-roads. The project will promote walking and cycling, by expanding the cycle network and providing options for cycling away from the general traffic and safer crossing points for pedestrians.

6. Information used to analyse the effects on equality:

There is no significant benefit or adverse impact on any groups as a result of the works. The project will improve road safety which will benefit all road users and pedestrians, and aim to reduce the number and severity of road traffic collisions and resultant casualties.

Local Disability Groups will be engaged with as part of the design phase to understand their concerns and accessibility issues. The EIA will be updated to incorporate any equality impacts or concerns that may be identified along with mitigation. The aim will be to incorporate as many improvements as possible to solve these issues as part of the project.

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National guidance and design standards will be adhered to ensure any measure implemented as part of the project meet current standards.

Community engagement events will be undertaken to ensure all interested parties have the opportunity to feed into the development of the proposals.

All proposals will be subject to a consultation, including letter drops to frontages, street notices, paper adverts and online, with Local Members, residents and businesses. Nottingham City Council consultation procedures will be adhered to and the team will familiarise themselves with the guidance around consultations, http://intranet.nottinghamcity.gov.uk/analysis-and-insight/.

Road Safety and Traffic Management have a list of over 50 stakeholders that will be consulted with to ensure the opportunity for a diverse range of groups and organisations to feed into the project development process is provided.

The project design will be subject to Stages 1, 2 and 3 Road Safety Audits.

The installations also act as traffic calming measures, assisting to slow vehicle speeds. The works will be programmed in collaboration with Highways Services and Network Management to secure road space and that the work can be co-ordinated and completed with minimum disruption The proposals include:

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- 1. Dedicated signalised pedestrian crossings to be introduced at the three arm Triumph Road junction.
- 2. Two new central refuge crossing points where there are currently no pedestrian facilities.
- 3. Install a zebra crossing on Gregory Boulevard.
- 4. Nine new central refuge points with footway build-outs on either side along the route.

The project will create two School Safety Schemes which will benefit all road users and pedestrians included younger people going to school. The projects aims to install measures to increase road safety by reducing vehicle speed outside of the two local schools.

The proposals include:

- 5. Create two School Safety Schemes.
 - i. Reduce speed limit to 20mph.
 - ii. Introduce traffic calming measures by narrowing the road.
 - iii. Introduce traffic calming measure by installing Vehicle Activated Signs.

There are no impacts or benefits on other people in the protected groups.
