Decision Being Taken:

To note that up to

£417,000 ring-fenced public health grant will be spent on activity to support the delivery of the Gambling Harm Strategy 2023-2028, and to note that this expenditure has been approved by the Section 151 Officer, to include;

- £120,000 to procure gambling related harm training and resources for professional working with children and young people (£40,000 per annum x 3 years)
- £105,000 to procure enhanced training and support for professional using targeted screening to detect gambling related harm (£35,000 per annum x 3 years)
- £150,000 to procure a gambling recovery service (£50,000 per annum x 3 years)
- Up to £42,000 on public aware campaigns over a four year period (2023/24-2026/27)

To approve procurement of a contract for the delivery of the three services listed above (1a-1c) through a full tender process; and

To delegate authority to the

Director of Public Health to award the outcome of the tender processes/s and the lead Consultant in Public Health to sign the contract.

Reasons for the Decision(s) | margin-left:0cm">BackgroundOne of the current priorities in Nottingham's Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy is to support the financial wellbeing of citizens. An important element of that work will be preventing and reducing gambling related harm because of the potential significant harms of a gambling problem on financial wellbeing, as well as on other important areas of wellbeing, including mental and physical health, employment, education and social relationships. Our recent gambling related harm health needs assessment showed. Because of its demographic profile, Nottingham has a relatively large number of citizens who experience, or are at risk of, gambling related harm. Approximately 5,500 people in Nottingham aged 11 years and older have, or at risk of, a gambling problem. This includes nearly 1000 young people between 11 and 16 years of age. For each person with a gambling problem, on average 6 to 10 other people - such as friends, family members and colleagues - are affected, and they too experience harm.. National and local gambling support services exist, and have recently expanded with the launch of the East Midlands NHS Gambling Harm clinic. There are currently no gambling recovery services in Nottingham.. Many people in Nottingham who need support with a gambling problem are not aware of the available local and national support services, and few people access support. In 2021 to 2022, only 46 individuals from Nottingham contacted the national GamCare helpline about their own or someone else's gambling. In interviews as part of the development of the Nottingham Gambling Harm Strategy, citizens with lived experience of gambling harm told us they did not access support when they needed it because they were not aware it existed. Following completion of the health needs assessment, a strategic partnership including partner agencies and people with lived experience developed the Nottingham Gambling Harm Strategy 2023 - 2028. The strategy was endorsed by the Health and Wellbeing Board in July 2023. New activity will be needed to meet some core strategy objectives. These are to: 1. raise awareness of the risks and impacts of gambling with population-wide and targeted approaches2. provide information on gambling risks and impacts among children and young people, and their trusted adults3.<span style="font-variant-numeric: normal; font-variant-east-asian: normal;font-variant-alternates: normal;font-kerning: auto;


