Short Breaks

The Commissioning Team announced the successful launch of the Short Breaks Day Activities for Disabled Children Pilot on 13th January. For several years, the local market for short breaks for disabled children has faced significant challenges, lacking diversity of choice for children and families. After a year of robust market shaping and development efforts, we have successfully contracted six activity providers offering a wide range of activities, including music lessons, creative arts, basketball, and various sporting activities.

Funded by the DfE Short Breaks Fund, the pilot garnered substantial interest, with 36 children attending activities throughout January and February. The primary goal of the pilot was to stimulate interest in the activities market and gather valuable insights to inform the development of a sustainable and diverse short breaks offer for Nottingham City Disabled Children and their Families in the long term.

We look forward to the positive impact this initiative will have on our community.

Adult Social Care:
