Executive Summary:

- The ICP approved the Nottingham and Nottinghamshire's Integrated Care Strategy on 13 March 2023. The strategy has been publicised on the ICS website: https://healthandcarenotts.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2021/05/Integrated-Care-Strategy-2023_27.pdf
- 2. The Integrated Care Partnership (ICP) confirmed in October 2023 that there would be a "light touch" review of the Integrated Care Strategy at the end of the first year. The updated Strategy is presented with the changes outlined in the paper for Board members to consider.
- 3. At the end of this first year of delivery, the ICP will review and reconfirm the Integrated Care Strategy at their 22 March 2024 meeting.

Refresh of the Integrated Care Strategy

- 4. Since the last Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) meeting, DHSC have updated guidance on the preparation of Integrated Care Strategies: https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/guidance-on-the-preparation-of-integrated-care-strategies/guidance-on-the-preparation-of-integrated-care-strategies
- 5. The refreshed Integrated Care Strategy considered at the ICP on 22 March 2024 is in Appendix 1 to this paper. The changes include strengthened wording around the 14 priorities articulated in the Strategy and increased emphasis on children and young people, and frail elderly.
- 6. The Chair and DPH will provide an update verbally at the meeting on the outcome of the ICP discussion.

Delivery of the 14 priorities of the Integrated Care Strategy

- 7. The Strategy is overseen and delivered by the City and County HWBs and Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategies, and the Integrated Care Board through the NHS Joint Forward Plan.
- 8. The Chair and DPH have advised the ICP on the key areas of progress on behalf of the City HWB.
- Consideration is being given to a Strategy Oversight Group to consider delivery, risks and issues collectively across partners organisations, and to ensure ongoing development of the Strategy throughout the year is being considered.
