

Quality cushions stitched up in local youth club !!!!

Local young people sew their own designer cushions!

The young people in the Riverside Youth Club requested to do some fun art projects as part of their youth sessions, so looking in the cupboard at what resources we had, discovered materials to make cushions complete with covers and stuffing.

The young people looked at designs from google images and pinterest before choosing their own unique styled cushion to decorate and stitch together. They worked together to help each other come up with designs and

ideas, using materials such as felt, faux fur and tye dye, and had fun cutting and stitching their own cushions. They learned new skills such as how to set up and thread a sewing machine, different stitching styles they can use and hand sewing work. They also used fabric glue, and wonder web to fix items to their cushions.

The young people worked on these for 4 weeks, and some fantastic cushions were made. They were able to take these home to show parents, and use as a cushion in their rooms.

The young people were so enthusiastic, they would like to do more of the same, looking at different sewing projects and ideas that could enhance their sewing skills and machine work.



Young people "Have Their Say"

At the Riverside Youth Centre, young people took part in the Active Participation Project. The aim of the project was to gather information from the young people about their local Community. For them to take an active part by voicing their opinions and sharing their views about what they liked & would change in their community.

Local Councillors and Area Wards Maps were also introduced to the young people via booklets, poster & conversations with staff. This was to inform the young people of who was responsible for the area they lived in and who

they could contact with any queries they may have or want to share their views with.

During the project staff went out into the community with young people to help gather photographs to show their opinions & views, young people also took their own pictures in their own time and shared them with staff.

As a result of all the information gathered an amazing display board, a 3D model of Bulwell Bogs and a canvas using spray painting art were created.

The project was a success. Young people shared so much information with staff, giving staff an understanding of what young people really thought about their community & how changes could be made to make their community a better place for them in the future.

Many young people took part in the Active Participation Project. The end result was very carefully created using different designs to show opinions & views. **Well done** to all who participated. I thoroughly enjoyed my part in delivering this project.

As well as having the opportunity to travel around the world implementing their skills. The representatives from the armed forces finished off with a range of challenging team building activities for the young people.

The young people impressed both staff and the army with the way they worked together to tackle the team challenges. They worked well together and some took on leadership roles and took charge of the activities themselves. All young people participated including some young people who in the past have avoided taking part in group games. Both staff and the army were pleased with the young people's commitment and the level of maturity and behaviour.

Euro 2016 comes to the Ridge

Children learn about football and much more through 10 week project.

The European Cup in 2016 inspired lots of our members to want to learn more about football. Children from the play session approached staff with a request to train and set up a football team.

After getting the go ahead from senior manager's, staff at the Ridge together with young people planned a 10 week football programme.

As well as focusing on key football skills such as dribbling and penalties children were encouraged to think about and discuss health life style choices. This ranged from warming up and down before and after matches to the importance of exercise and diet. Children were encouraged to express their views and reflect on their practice through team talks.

What developed from the 10 week programme was a diverse football team including children from a range of ages, genders and ability.

The project culminated in a football match in Southglade Park for the Park Life event on 28th July. The Ridge Team play groups of other children at the Park Life event, encouraging them to learn skills and become members at the Ridge.

Following the project staff at the Ridge have observed improved behaviour in the children who took part both on and off the pitch. The feedback from parents and children about the project have been hugely positive.

'Its taught me so many things such as; discipline and team work' Ovin aged 10.

'We have had our own responsibilities like putting the kits in the wash and sorting the team' Makenzie and Lovett aged 10.

Some of the young people involved have gone on to play for local league teams. Staff are looking forward to developing the project to look at tactics!

48 children and family members set out early on Wednesday 17 August for a day at Drayton Manor.


The weather was brilliant and there was loads on offer at the park from rollercoasters
