Reducing the use of bed and breakfast for homeless households

Total Value:

£586,000 (Type: Revenue)

Decision Being Taken:

- 1. To accept the Government Flexible Homeless Support Grant of £586,000 for use during 2017/18 towards:
- a. mitigation of the costs of bed and breakfasts used to meet the statutory duty in regard to homeless households;
- b. £89,448 for staff and associated costs to prevent people becoming homeless;
- c. £43,224 for staff to ensure as much income as possible is secured to support costs associated with providing accommodation.
- 2. To grant dispensation from Contract Procedure Rule 5.1.2, in accordance with Financial Regulation 3.29, to award a contract worth £31,500 per year to Framework Housing Association for the delivery of an accommodation based support service, for a period of 3 years from 14 August 2017, of 18 units for housing vulnerable families, and delegate authority to the Strategic Director of Economic Development to sign the contract.
- 3. To delegate authority to the Strategic Director of Economic Development to alter the current allocations policy in order to enable a direct offer of accommodation as a discharge of the statutory duty, subject to a statutory review at a later date.

Reasons for the Decision(s) There has been a nationwide rise in homelessness which has also impacted Nottingham. There has been an increased demand for places, a limited supply of temporary hostel beds and a reduced supply of properties for permanent rehousing. As a result, the use of Bed and Breakfast as a means of meeting our statutory duty to provide accommodation for people presenting as homeless has increased significantly: from virtually zero in 2014/15 to £646,000 in 2016/17 (based on 20,000 household days in B&B). This looks set to rise even further in 2017/18 - potentially to at least £1.6m based on figures from April to June. Not only does B&B impose a significant cost on the City Council, but it is not an appropriate way to accommodate homeless people for a pro-longed period of time.

> We have recently received a Government Grant (the Flexible Homelessness Support Grant) of £586,000 in 2017/18 and are anticipating £623,000 in 2018/19 (which will be subject to a separate delegated decision). This grant gives us the opportunity to invest in measures which will both reduce demand for temporary accommodation and increase the supply of non-B&B accommodation both of which will reduce the number of household days in B&B and hence the cost. In addition we can also implement activities which will ensure as much income as possible is secured to offset costs to the Council and alter the allocations policy so as to reduce the amount of time that individuals are waiting before they are found more permanent accommodation.

Other Options Considered:

Making no changes to the allocations policy was rejected as the 3 weeks Choice Based Lettings bidding time delays exit from temporary accommodation.

Using the Flexible Homelessness Support Grant to meet day-to-day costs of B&B was rejected as it would result in a substantial overspend likely to exceed £1,000,000 during 2017/18.

Going out to tender for provision of accommodation was rejected as there is an immediate opportunity to commission appropriate accommodation from a provider with which we have an existing contract, at a reasonable cost, on a basis which will make a major contribution to reducing reliance on B&B in the short term. NCC need to act now to reduce B&B pressures and bring spending under control - a competitive tender will take time to complete and incur additional expense in B&B spend during the process which will far outweigh any possible saving. NCC are undertaking a wider exercise to determine how approximately £4,000,000 p/a will be used to fund homelessness services in the City from 2018/19 onwards and the services to be commissioned following this work will be subject to a competitive tender and future decision.

The decision for 18 units of accommodation for homeless families is supported from a procurement perspective providing that VFM is demonstrated. It is understood that this decision required approval to seek dispensation from Contract Procedure Rule 5.1.2 in accordance with Financial Regulation (3.29) (Operational Issues) with respect to a tender, to allow for the direct award of a contract to Framework Housing Association. There will be a requirement to delegate authority to the relevant Director to sign the contract. The decision is below the EU procurement threshold. A service specification and contract will be required to be developed, with the contract being managed. Any further proposals would be required to be in accordance with Contract Procedure and Financial Regulations.
