Other Options Considered:

1) Not To Accept The Grant. The grant represents one part in a once in a generation opportunity to enhance the historic environment within Sneinton Market Conservation Areas. The grant-aid from Historic England for the entire Heritage Action Zone programme would represent their greatest investment in any place in England by Historic England over the next 5 years. If Nottingham City Council do not take this opportunity it is unlikely that this scale of support would be made by Historic England in the future. Nottingham City Council would lose the additional benefits of the scheme provided by Historic England such as expert advice, research and promotion of the city. For this reason, this option was rejected.

2) Apply for Heritage Lottery Funding. Nottingham City Council could potential apply for Townscape Heritage funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund to achieve a similar result as the Heritage Action Zone. The process of application for the HLF is much more protracted and inflexible than Historic England's grants and we would not expect success in the next 5 years as we already have a Townscape Heritage programme on Carrington Street. For this reason, this option was rejected.

The total funding package for the scheme is through a combination of HE grant, private sector investment and match funding over a 5 year period. Heritage Action Zones (HAZs) are Historic England's flagship initiative to help transform Historic Places and promote growth through heritage-led regeneration. The Heart of Nottingham HAZ comprises an exciting and innovative array of projects to help safeguard and celebrate the heritage of Nottingham. With a total budget of £2.7 million this is currently the largest and most ambitious HAZ in England. The project will breathe new life into some of the city's neglected historic buildings and sites, bringing them back into use as housing or retail spaces, and transform the city centre's 'at risk' conservation areas.

The scheme is being run in partnership with Nottingham City Council and will help to restore the city's historic character, boost tourism and create jobs. Historic England in the East Midlands will provide an estimated £1.6million to the project, with the rest to come from public and private funds. Nottingham City Council will manage and deliver the programme.

Some of the areas being targeted for regeneration are: Old Market Square and Lace Market, home to the city's Creative Quarter, which were both added to the Register of conservation areas at risk in 2016; and Sneinton Market, popular with new start-ups.

Heart of Nottingham Heritage Action Zone

The principal partners in the Heritage Action Zone are:

- Historic England
- Nottingham City Council
- Nottingham Creative Quarter
- Nottingham Heritage Panel
- Nottingham Civic Society.

Between now and 2022 the aims include:

- helping owners repair and reinstate historic features in Old Market Square, Sneinton Market and the Lace Market
- publishing advice for owners of Nottingham's caves, enabling them to conserve them and improve access for the public
- funding repairs to Bromley House Library
- updating the national List of historic buildings

- working with owners to find a future for some of Nottingham's most distinctive but vulnerable buildings
- recruiting an army of volunteers to help survey buildings at risk across the city
- publishing a book on historic Nottingham, with an accompanying exhibition
- training teachers to make use of the city's heritage for education.

The successful bid by Nottingham City Council to become a Heritage Action Zone follows publication of the award-winning Nottingham Heritage Strategy in 2015. Since its preparation began the Council and local organisations have been working closely together, supported by advice from Historic England. A Panel has been established to oversee its implementation. The Heritage Action Zone will enable many of the aims of the strategy to be fulfilled. 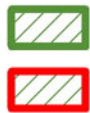
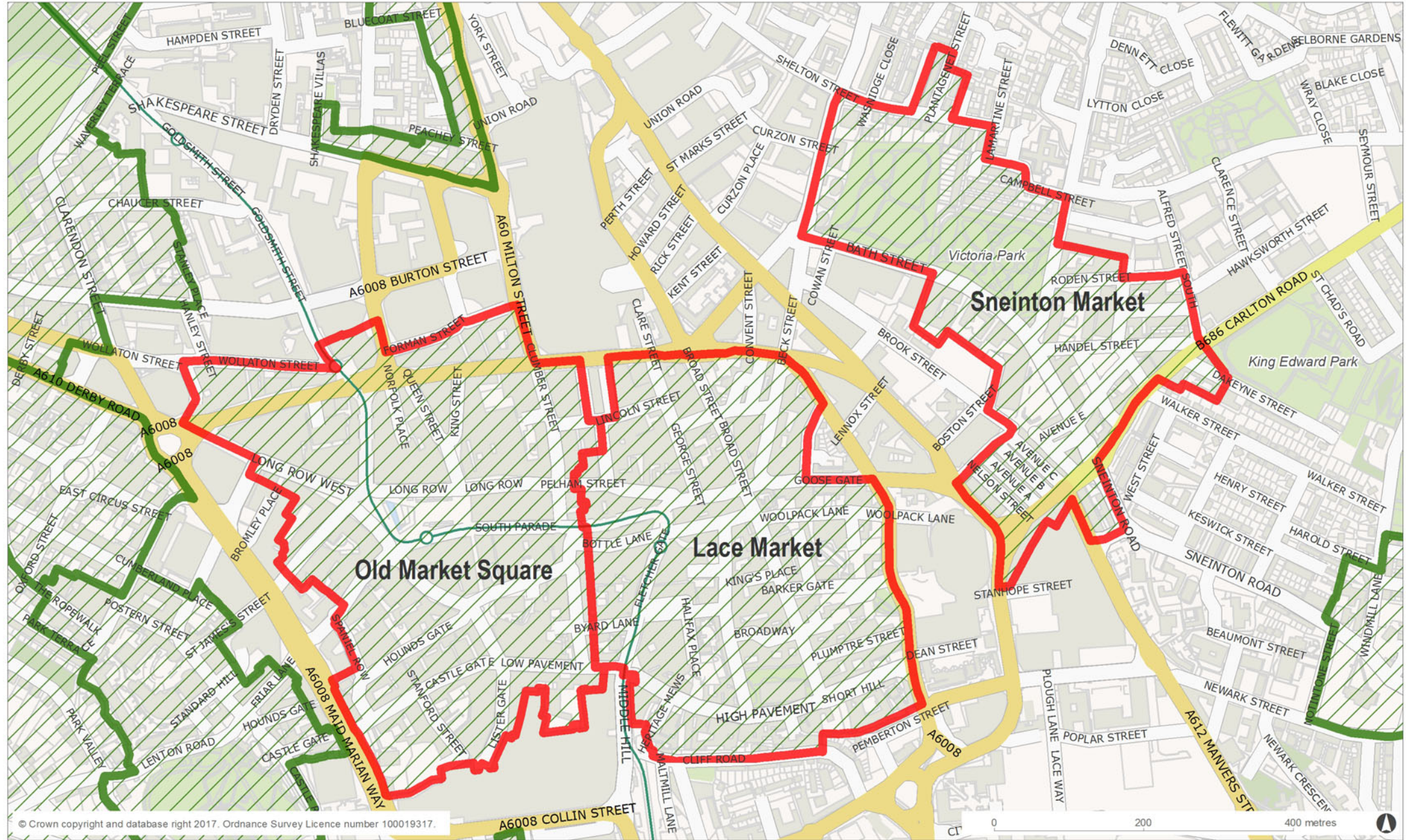
