1. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

1.1 Section 21 of the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act 1949 gives local authorities the power to acquire, declare and manage nature reserves. These sites are commonly known as Local Nature Reserves (LNR's) and are statutory protected sites which are of a high value for nature conservation and provide opportunities for people to enjoy wildlife and recreation. From Natural England's

perspective LNR's have an important part to play in biodiversity conservation, the protection and interpretation of features and in helping to reach priority targets. Local Authorities can benefit from declaring Local Nature Reserves through the contribution that the sites make to the quality of the environment for local people, the part that they play in community development and their value in education.

- 1.2 Natural England recommends that Local Nature Reserves be provided at 1 hectare per 1000 population; Nottingham currently has 13 LNR's and LNR provision stands at 0.53 Ha per 1000 population.
- 1.3 Provision for further LNR's has been discussed at the Open and Green Spaces Champions Group and is an action in the 2011 Breathing Space strategy and the Biodiversity Position Statement (BPS). The target within the BPS is for an additional 10 LNRs by 2020. A list of proposed LNRs has been produced in agreement with the Champions group.
- 1.4 Wollaton Park within Area 7 has been selected for designation as an LNR due to its ecological importance and position within the community. Not all of the site is proposed (see Appendix 1) in order to retain the multifunctional nature of the site. If the designation proceeds the site will exceed the City Council's target of providing 1ha LNR per 1,000 population to 1.08ha LNR per 1,000 population.

The site largely comprises historic parkland, mixed deciduous woodland, acid grassland and open water. Woodlands are diverse and include oak, beech, sweet chestnut and lime with an understorey of rhododendron, yew, hawthorn, hazel and other regenerating tree species. Lime Tree Avenue to the east is as the name states, two rows of mature lime trees parallel to a main pedestrian route into the site and vehicular access to the golf course. The golf course is a typical mosaic of well maintained amenity grassland; rough grassland, individual trees and bare sand.

The two deer herds comprise of 150 fallow deer and 80 red deer. They are free to roam across the whole site and have fenced off areas where they can seek refuge during rutting and calving seasons as well as when the park is busy.

Surfaced paths run throughout the site and are easily accessible for all abilities. Pedestrian entrances exist off Wollaton Road, Middleton Avenue and Parkside. Vehicular access is via Wollaton Road and there are two pay and display car parks available which serve the entire site.

2. BACKGROUND (INCLUDING OUTCOMES OF CONSULTATION)

2.1 Between November 2013 and February 2014 a public consultation was held on the proposals to designate part of Wollaton Park as an LNR.

The consultation involved the following:

- Displaying a sign on the site entrances
- Posters within the Hall
- Letters to adjacent residential properties (212)
- Letters to internal and external consultees (38)
- Attendance at the Friends of Wollaton Park meeting
- Posters in community notice boards
- Meeting with Wollaton Park Golf Course
- Site visit with Natural England

- Online consultation promoted on website and Parks and Open Spaces Facebook page
- 2.2 11 email responses were received from members of the public. 12 online responses were submitted through the on-line consultation. Internal emails were received from colleagues Arts and Events, Rights of Way and Drainage. Letters of support were received from the Wollaton Park Golf Course and the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust. No support letter has been received from Natural England to date, as they have requested a final boundary following the consultation. This will be sent in May 2014. A summary of responses is detailed below:

External responses

Severn Trent have enquired as to the implications of the designation. They have been advised that they will still be granted access for necessary works. We have asked that they contact us in advance of any planned work.

The National Grid has asked to be made aware of our decision to proceed with the designation.

Online responses

Of the 12 responses submitted, 10 people said they were in support of the proposals and 2 said there was not enough information about any restrictions or limitations that may be put in place. There was no way of responding to these queries as they did not leave contact details. One consultee commented that they were in support if necessary measures were in place to protect boundaries properly and prevent badgers from escaping the park.

Internal responses

The Senior Drainage Engineer responded regarding Wollaton Park lake (classified as a dam) and the associated its associated control features and the watercourses downstream of the dam. The dam is Category A (highest risk category) and is subject to the Reservoirs Act 1975. Concerns were raised about an LNR designation preventing the Council from complying with the associated legislation. The dam area has high botanical value. Advice from colleagues in the Legal department is that the statutory responsibilities with regard to the dam aren't considered a bar to declaring a nature reserve. The declaration would enable the lands to be managed for a recreational purpose which would include preserving wildlife. They advised that the management plan includes ways to establish a working relationship with colleagues to ensure no harm to the area during statutory works.

The Public Rights of Way Officer is in full support of the proposal

The Markets and Events Service Manager submitted the following comments:

• Lime Tree Avenue

This is the main vehicular access point during large scale events so there is a significant amount of traffic on the avenue on these days. In the past some vehicles have been parked on the verges of the avenue.

• Middleton Paddock

The former cricket pitch and Pilkington's Paddock are used for event car parking and exhibitor's caravan parking. As long as the option remains to continue to use

these areas for these requirements then the proposal should not impact the events programme.

• Various Footpaths

The site is used for cross country and orienteering events. Local Nature Reserve which would link up to form a route for this type of activity. We discussed that a small scale event would not have an impact on the reserve, but there is ambition to host national and international events that could become a much larger scale event. The proposal should be flexible enough to allow such events to be staged.

The Local Nature Reserve designation handbook advises that Schedule 11 (12) of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006, which replaced Section 15 of the National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act 1949, describes a 'nature reserve' as:

- o land managed solely for a conservation purpose, or
- land managed not only for a conservation purpose but also for a recreational purpose, if the management of the land for the recreational purpose does not compromise its management for the conservation purpose.

Some of the current recreational activities that take place would not appear to be an appropriate use of a LNR, and the management of the site for the recreational purposes could be seen to compromise its management for the conservation purpose. The boundaries have been drawn up to reflect this. Occasional use of parking would have to be controlled to ensure no damage to ground flora. Consultation with Arts and Events team prior to event planning is recommended.

4.1 In declaring the site as a Local Nature Reserve there is a duty to maintain safe access and manage it for the protection of wildlife and biodiversity, however as the site is already owned by Nottingham City Council and maintained as accessible, this duty already exists.

5. <u>RISK MANAGEMENT ISSUES (INCLUDING LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND CRIME</u> <u>AND DISORDER ACT IMPLICATIONS)</u>

5.1 Legal Implications

The declaration of the site as an LNR is within the Council's powers subject to the relevant processes being followed.

All sites are free to access and aim to be accessible to all. Any capital works and improvements identified will consider the requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act and will seek to identify and remove physical and emotional barriers to access. Designating the site will ensure that it remains as natural open space, which is accessible to all communities and will therefore play a part in improving the quality of life of the local residents and citizens from the wider community now, and into the future.

Crime and Disorder Act Implication

The project will help to attract additional visitors to the park and reduce the fear of crime and disorder.

Health and Wellbeing Implications

The project will help to improve the wildlife based education and interpretation on the site. These improvements will encourage more people to participate in casual recreational activities such as walking and wildlife watching, contributing to improvements to physical and mental health.


