Reducing the use of Bed and Breakfast for homeless households

Total Value:

£623,158 (Type: Revenue)

Decision Being Taken:

To accept the Government Flexible Homeless Support Grant of £623,158 for use during 2018/19 towards the series of measures outlined in the Appendix 'Programme for use of Flexible Homeless Support Grant'

To delegate authority to the Corporate Director of Development and Growth to adjust the remit of spend between the listed measures as demand requires within the financial envelope.

To approve dispensation from Contract Procedure Rules 5.1.1 in accordance with Financial Regulation 3.29 (Operational Issues) in order for Nottingham Community Housing Association to deliver the accommodation and support at Linby Drive and Corporation Oaks as outlined in points 2 & 3 within Appendix 'Programme for use of Flexible Homeless Support Grant'. This provision will assist with the reduction in use of Bed & Breakfast accommodation. The needs are urgent but the value is modest and below the EU procurement threshold.

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Reasons for the Decision(s) The ongoing national rise in homelessness has had impact in Nottingham and there has been subsequent demand for temporary accommodation from families and vulnerable single adults to whom the local authority has a statutory duty to accommodate. The existing level of provision of temporary accommodation has not been sufficient in meeting the demand and as a result the use of Bed and Breakfast (B&B) has continued. In the last quarter of 2017/18 there were an average of 13 households placed in Bed and Breakfast per week.

> Use of Bed and Breakfast is not an appropriate way to accommodate homeless people for a prolonged period of time. Furthermore, it imposes a significant cost on Nottingham City Council and in 2017/18 Bed & Breakfast expenditure led to an overspend of £0.786m.

In 2017/18 NCC received £586,000 funding from Government in the form of the Flexible Homelessness Support Grant to help us invest in measures to both reduce demand for temporary accommodation and increase the supply of non-B&B accommodation. The result of these interventions was a reduction in use of B&B from a snapshot high of 140 households in October 2017 to a low of 37 households in February 2018. However, the introduction of the Homelessness Reduction Act in April 2018 (alongside further limitations in supply of permanent accommodation) has increased upward pressure for temporary accommodation.

Nottingham City Council has received a further Flexible Homeless Support Grant award of £623,000 for 2018/19 which gives us opportunity to invest in further measures and implement the plan to reduce (and eventually end) reliance on B&B and its associated high cost to the Council.

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Other Options Considered:	Using the Flexible Homelessness Support Grant (FHSG) to meet day-to-day costs of Bed & Breakfast was rejected as it would result in a forecast overspend of at least £742,000 during 2018/19 without prevention work.
	Use of the FHSG entirely on preventative measures was rejected, as it would do nothing to address the existing needs and pressures and Nottingham City Council need to act now to reduce Bed & Breakfast pressures and bring spending under control.
	Use of the FHSG to tender for provision of temporary accommodation was rejected, as it would not stem the flow of demand from people in need of temporary accommodation. Additionally a competitive tender will take time to complete and incur additional expense in B&B spend during the process which will far outweigh any possible saving. Nottingham City Council have recently completed a wider tender exercise and awarded contracts for housing related support services to the value of approximately £4,000,000 p/a.
	Using the FHSG to increase supply of permanent housing (beyond facilitating access to accommodation in the private rented sector through Housing Aid) was rejected as the changes to the allocations policy take effect from April 2019 and further supply is being addressed through the Nottingham City Council property acquisition and Building a Better Nottingham housing programme.

Legal Advice:

This report raises no significant legal issues. The financial value of services to be commissioned in paragraphs 2 and 3 of the costs report is below the relevant EU procurement financial threshold and on that basis it is permissible to make the contract awards in accordance with the dispensation requested. The contracts described in paragraphs 4, 5 and 6 are for the rental of accommodation only and are therefore exempt from the procurement rules. Documentation should be put in place with the providers setting out the purpose for which the funding must be used, this will ensure the funding is not unlawful state aid, and retaining the nomination rights for the City Council. Finance Advice:

A grant was received at the beginning of the financial year of £623,158 and this will be used for both investment in prevention work, and payments for accommodation needed - both in terms of commission additional units and in meeting Bed and Breakfast costs.

A breakdown of the intended expenditure is attached within the decision and use of the grant in these ways is in line with the grant purpose and conditions.

Monitoring of the expenditure and use of the grant is undertaken monthly with the Corporate Director of Development and Growth to ensure that mitigation can be enacted if required to minimise the pressure on the Council of further spend on Bed and Breakfast.

Procurement Advice:

Dispensation from Contract Procedure Rule 5.1.1, in accordance with Financial Regulation 3.29(operational issues) is supported by Procurement in relation to the decisions as detailed at point 2(b) i and ii of the appendix to extend the current contract, and as detailed at point 3 of the appendix in order for a direct award. In both instances, the provision of this temporary accommodation will assist with the reduction in use of B & B accommodation. The value of these proposals fall below the EU procurement threshold.
